




Funding Availability Chart

8.2 FY 2016-25 Transportation Improvement Program - Amendment #7

- NCDOT's STIP Unit notified the MPO of amendments to the 2016-2025 State TIP. The MPO should update the TIP to reflect these changes in order to meet federal regulations stating that the TIP and STIP must be identical and include all projects with federal funding or are deemed regionally significant.
- Staff has released the draft FY 2016-2017 Transportation Improvement Program - Amendment #7 for public review and comment from September 7, 2017 through October 8, 2017 and tentatively scheduled a public hearing at the October 2017 Executive Board meeting.





PUBLICTRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS IN NORTH CAROLINA BY CATEGORY




North Carolina's Transit Investment Statewide Mobility and Access to Opportunity




FY 2016 North Carolina Transit Operations Revenue by Source



Exceptional Growth in Urban Public Transportation Ridership




North Carolina Non-Urbanized and Urbanized Population 1950 to 2010

 By 2036, North Carolina's population of persons older than age 65 will grow by a million persons, or 64.5 percent.





TCC Responses/Draft CAMPO Comments

- Additional funding contributions for operating assistance and capital replacement and expansion projects from the State of North Carolina for public transportation should be provided.
- Additional capacity and opportunities for local governments to raise revenue for public transportation should be enabled in State legislation.
- State funding should be more available with a greater degree of certainty to support the phased and incremental construction of high capacity fixed guideway networks, including those that facilitate bus rapid transit (BRT) and commuter rail transit (CRT) travel.
- The technical capacity of the North Carolina Department of Transportation Public Transportation Division (NCDOT-PTD) should be expanded to assist local transit agencies with their needs and compliance issues. NCDOT-PTD needs more and better paid staff resources to provide the level of technical assistance and support necessary.
